Ms. Purdy,

I'm a reporter from USA TODAY. We are hoping to obtain a copy of the original trial for Leonard Forte, which your office has apparently located. I have tried since September 2019 to locate either transcripts or audio of the trial. The stenographer notes and audio are not obtainable from the courts, and I was told by regional court clerk Laurie Canty, who personally searched for them, that their record of the original trial had been destroyed. When I asked David Tartter, the public of the prosecution of the case for decades, about acquiring the trial transcript, he told me via email: "But if the court doesn't have the stenographer notes, I can't imagine where they would be. They won't be in the files of either the State's Attorney or the AG's Office."

As I'm sure you are aware, there is a presumption of public access for court proceedings and resulting transcripts. Allowing such access seems even more important for a case that has garnered intense public interest. If I need to file a public records request for the transcript, I will do so, but I'm hoping that if that is the case the request is expedited due to the confusion and misinformation concerning the existence of this record.
