#### NOTICE OF <<VARIABLE DATA 1>>

Assumption University ("AU") is writing to notify you of an incident that may involve some of your information. This notice provides you with information about the incident, our response, and additional steps you may take to protect your information, should you determine it is appropriate to do so. Notably, we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of information regarding this incident.

What Happened? On April 4, 2023, we discovered unusual activity occurring on certain employee email accounts. Upon this discovery, we quickly initiated an investigation which included working with third-party forensic specialists to understand the nature and scope of the activity. Our investigation determined that two AU email accounts were subject to unauthorized access between March 4, 2023, and April 4, 2023, and that data may have been accessed by an unauthorized actor during that time. As a result, AU performed a comprehensive review of the data determined to be at risk to assess the type of information potentially affected and to whom it related. On September 18, 2023, we completed this review and determined the information potential impacted as a result of this event. We are notifying you because our investigation determined information related to you was contained within the potentially affected data.

**What Information Was Involved?** The investigation determined that your name and the following information related to you was contained in the potentially impacted data: << Data Elements>>.

What We Are Doing. Upon discovering this incident, we quickly took steps to respond which included reviewing and enhancing our existing policies and procedures related to network security. Moreover, as an added precaution, AU is offering individuals access to 24 months of complimentary credit monitoring and identity restoration services out of an abundance of caution. Instructions regarding how to enroll in these services can be found in this enclosure.

What You Can Do. While we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information, we encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. You may also utilize the credit monitoring enrollment instructions below to enroll in complimentary credit monitoring services.

WebScan searches for your Social Security Number, up to 5 passport numbers, up to 6 bank account numbers, up to 6 credit/debit card numbers, up to 6 email addresses, and up to 10 medical ID numbers. WebScan searches thousands of Internet sites where consumers' personal information is suspected of being bought and sold, and regularly adds new sites to the list of those it searches. However, the Internet addresses of these suspected Internet trading sites are not published and frequently change, so there is no guarantee that we are able to locate and search every possible Internet site where consumers' personal information is at risk of being traded.

## **Monitor Your Accounts**

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit <a href="www.annualcreditreport.com">www.annualcreditreport.com</a> or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer's name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

## **Additional Information**

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General.
